About Our Featured Organist, Paul Quarino

Paul Quarino has been accompanying silent films for us at the Towe Auto Museum since 1993, played concerts for us at the Fair Oaks Clubhouse and Morton Madness. For 22 years, Paul was the primary organist at the Portland Organ Grinder restaurant where for 12 years he had a Sunday afternoon program called "The Gospel According to Paul" which attracted quite a following. It is this that he will share with us next.

> As Musical Products Evaluator for the Rodgers Organ Company, Paul now lives in Hillsboro, Oregon. He has spent most of his life playing the organ in Concerts, Silent Film Presentations and Restaurant Entertainment. Over the years, Paul has been an American Theatre Organ Society convention favorite and he has three recordings to his credit.

So, What IS Gospel Music?

From the smooth sounds of Sam Cooke to the dancing, acrobatic vocals of Kirk Franklin, gospel music does more than just sound sweet--it literally moves its listeners. Whether it's swaying with the choirs or tappin' along with the quartets or simply raising hands to the rhythm of soul-stirring crooners, gospel is one genre of music that needs to be heard. Once narrowly defined as religious, gospel has transcended those limits to become a profound force in American music and popular culture.

The term "gospel music" actually encompasses a number of subgenres, from the original Negro spirituals to the most contemporary Christian "Praise and Worship" songs used in modern worship services. Gospel music in general deals with religious (largely Christian) themes based on sacred texts and traditions. As with rock music, gospel music evolved from two separate but influential paths: Caucasian religious hymnody and African-American traditional spirituals. Today's subgenres of gospel music can all be placed along the path of intersection between those two musical philosophies.

"Gospel music is coming to the mainstream," says gospel diva Yolanda Adams. "Singers are coming out of the church and introducing the gospel style to a mainstream audience." Gospel music is composed and performed for many purposes, including aesthetic pleasure, religious or ceremonial purposes, and as an entertainment product for the marketplace.
