SIMON GLEDHILL in Concert

On the Walt Strony Signature Series Allen Organ

Sunday, June 23, 4pm 828 W. Main St, Grass Valley

This is a fund raising event for the Church Organ Fund.

Simon Gledhill was born near Halifax, in the county of West Yorkshire in the north of England. It was clear at an early age that he had strong musical leanings, probably transmitted through the generations from his artistic maternal grandmother. He made his first major musical decision at the age of six when, after seeing a friend's toy accordion at school, he announced to his parents that the accordion was the instrument for him. They recognized his enthusiasm and acquired an accordion for him. They also found him a good teacher – no small achievement as accordion teachers are few and far between. In the early days the accordion was so large relative to Simon's small frame, that he had to be tied to the back of the chair on which he sat to play it to stop him from toppling over. He made strong progress, gaining awards in competitions and at the age of 15 was runner-up in the Under-16 British National Accordion Playing Championship.

Meanwhile, Simon's father had bought himself an electronic organ for his own use and it soon became clear that Simon showed an aptitude for that instrument, too. Again, he was fortunate enough to find a good teacher who taught him classical piano, classical organ and popular organ on which he gained exceptionally high marks in exams. He enthusiastically followed other organists, attending their performances, and it wasn't long before he discovered the theatre pipe organ to which he took like a duck to water. He was encouraged by other organists, and at the age of 16 gained first prize in the Northern Young Theatre Organist of the Year competition.

Simon decided that music would remain a hobby. He was doing well academically at school and at the age of 18 was admitted to the University of Cambridge, one of the most prestigious universities in Britain. He studied Natural Sciences,

specializing in Organic Chemistry, but decided that his career would be in the world of finance rather than science. He joined Lloyds Bank as a Graduate Trainee in 1987 and remained there for 26 years, rising to a senior position. He is now a divisional Chief Risk Officer at Legal & General, a multi-national financial services company based in London.

As a musician, Simon is in great demand and his "hobby" seems almost like a second career at times! Even though his main interest is in theatre organ, he is one of the few organists to successfully "cross the divide" by also giving recitals in churches, cathedrals and concert halls where he includes transcriptions of well-known orchestral pieces and some lighter music in his programs. He is especially known internationally as a theatre organist, and has toured just about every country in the world where theatre organs are found. He was twice honoured by the American Theatre Organ Society, having been named Organist of the Year and later admitted to the Society's "Hall of Fame" of distinguished theatre organists, past and present.

Simon's music has won high compliments from his peers, praising "... his rare combination of flawless technique, impeccable phrasing and an unerring sense of musical good taste," and describing him as "... someone who was born to be a theatre organist."

He has made over 20 commercial recordings over the years and has been heard on the radio many times. He was selected as the artist to make the first and only recording on the muchadmired Wurlitzer organ in the Castro Theatre, San Francisco. His most recent release was recorded in Switzerland on a historic instrument in a college close to the shores of Lake Geneva.

Richard Hills is one of the very few musicians truly to have bridged and mastered the divide between the world of the classical organ and that of the theatre organ. Having commenced classical organ studies under William Whitehead at Rochester Cathedral, he became Organ Scholar at Exeter College Oxford, studying with David Sanger. Further organ scholarships followed at Portsmouth Cathedral, where he studied with Rosemary Field and at Westminster Abbey.

He now pursues a freelance career and is Organist at St Mary's, Bourne Street, London. His career in the theatre organ world has been equally prestigious. He has numerous prizes and awards to his credit, both in this country and in the USA, where he was named by 'Organist of the Year' in 2010 by the American Theatre Organ Society. He has appeared many times on national and international TV and Radio, including solo appearances on programs as diverse as Radio 3 Choral Evensong and Radio 2's 'Friday Night is Music Night', and has several recording credits. His most recent solo recording was made on the magnificent dual-purpose Compton organ of Southampton's Guildhall.

When not on the bench Richard serves as Musical Advisor to the Cinema Organ Society and maintains a practical interest in organ building.
